This event is a partnership of four imaging societies: The Ophthalmic Photographers' Society (US), The Ophthalmic Imaging Association (UK), The Australian Institute of Medical & Biological Illustration (AU) and the Dutch Ophthalmic Photographers' Society (NL). This event only takes place once every 4 years where ophthalmic

photographers/ophthalmologists/optometrists meet form all over the world to share knowledge and experience.

The 3 days each had different themes.

Day 1

The theme was OCT (Optical Coherence Tomography), Imaging Tools, Education, Disease Screening and Monitoring.

Day 2

The theme was Fundus Imaging, Wide-Field Imaging and Multi-Modal Imaging.

Day 3

The theme was Anterior Segment Imaging, Deep Learning, Rare and Interesting Cases and the History of Ophthalmic Imaging. All the presenters including myself had 15 minutes to display their presentation which allowed for questions from the audience.

BARS ADMIN CERTIFICATE

The administration certificate was launched in September 2021, after the BARS virtual conference. By the BARS Education Group in association with Gloucestershire Retinal Education Group (GREG). Since then over 190 delegates have enrolled and 110 have successfully completed the course!

There are 8 modules. Each provides information, links, and 6 quiz sections.

By the end of the course the candidate will understand:

- Principles of Screening
- Informed choice, consent and clinical governance
- The impact screening may have on individuals
- Quality Assurance
- Diabetes and Eye Screening
- Exclusions and Suspensions
- Communication skills

The course also includes a competency assessment to confirm proficiency upon the patient management system, confidentiality, and the processes for dealing with individuals.

The qualification is hosted by Gloucester Retinal Education Group, and a certificate validated as a BARS approved course will be available to download on completion. Enrolment takes place quarterly on the following dates:

- 1st April
- 1st July
- 1st October
- 1st January

Enrolment takes place one week after but the application needs to be in by 1st to allow for administration. Any applications submitted after these dates will have to wait until the next cohort.

This course is FREE OF CHARGE, and we are hoping that Programmes will use this qualification as a tool for staff development, as well as helping staff to gain confidence in their role.
